At the time, Dixon was tinkling the '88s with the young Robert Cray Band, whose vocalist, Curtis Salgado, introduced Belushi to Dixon's '50s hit. Coincidentally, Salgado played The Yale earlier this week. Dixon, meanwhile, is building on the success of the 1996 Alligator Records disc, Wake Up & Live, which offers cool blues and west coast jump. The Dixon-Belushi tale comes from concert promoter Ron Simmonds, who promises another sweaty, intimate musical event at The Yale, 1300 Granville (9:30 p.m. show). Tix \$16 at the venue, 681-YALE.


## Ay, Caramba!
