ITEM 1 - CONFIRMATION OF MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING

ITEM 2 - GVRD GRANT FOR RECYCLING

T. Chong advised the Committee that after having made a presentation to the GVRD Recycling Committee meeting held during the evening of April 17, 1985 there was a lengthy debate regarding the merits of the City's application for \$2,000 funding grant to assist in the start-up of the curbside newspaper pick-up program. The GVRD Recycling Committee was reminded by some of its members of their resolution passed in October, 1984 as follows:

"Funds available to the GVRD Recycling Committee will be used for the sole purpose of advertising, promotion and education of recycling for the universal benefit of the residents of the Region and will not be allocated to favour or benefit a specific group".

After the lengthy debate, the GVRD Recycling Committee presed a new resolution amending the previous. It goes as follows:

"Local governments within the GVRD may request funds for the encouragement and promotion of recycling programs in their jurisdiction. The sum must not exceed that of the local governments recycling expenditure or \$2,000 whichever is the lesser amount. The GVRD contribution of this matching grant will not exceed \$2,000 in any one year and should not be considered to be an annual source of funds for any one project. The request should be accompanied with a general description of the activity".

Having passed the above resolution, the GVRD Recycling Committee then approved the City's \$2,000 funding grant application.

After the above briefing by T. Chong, the Environmental Protection Committee then proceeded to discuss how the GVRD grant funds are to be spent. It was decided that the City's matching amount of \$2,000 (already approved in '85 budget) be combined with the GVRD's \$2,000 grant and spent as follows:

- a. \$2,000 to be given to International Paper Industries for the purpose of off-setting the total cost for the purchase of the 9,000 plastic recycling bags needed for the curbside pick-up program.
- b. The remaining \$2,000 to be used for defraying 50% of the cost of printing new refuse collection schedule calendars and other advertising costs associated with the promotion of recycling in the City (i.e. brochures, signs, ads in local newspaper, etc.)

Alderman Stewart suggested that if ads are to be placed in the local newspaper, they should be coordinated with Port Moody who has also decided to provide the curbside pick-up of newspaper service for its residents.

ITEM 3 - OTHER BUSINESS

- a. Alderman Gates stated that an article should be placed in the next Community Newsletter by T. Chong, advising residents of the Environmental Protection Committee's activities re: first time that Committee has a budget, what will budget be used for and promote concept of recycling.
- b. Alderman Gates also requested that a copy of the response forwarded to the City by Art Purdon of the GVWD regarding the backflushing of chlorinated water into the local Salmonid Enhancement Program Hatchery be sent to the PoCO & District Hunting and Fishing Club and that Mr. Al Grist be invited to a future Committee meeting to discuss this matter further.

Re: Coquitlam Water Supply

In response to your letter of March 27, 1985 requesting information about the cause of the fish kill on Saturday, March 23rd, we present the following explanation.

B.C. Hydro had lowered the level of Coquitlam Lake to Elev. 450, which is over forty feet below the normal top water elevation, in order to carry out some maintenance repairs to their facilities on the Coquit-lam Dam and the Buntzen Tunnel. The lake had been at this elevation for approximately three weeks, during which time water customers in the Coquitlam service area were conscious of a change in normal water quality caused by the low water level and little inflow of fresh rainfall water. On the morning of Saturday, March 23rd, a heavy rainfall flushed silt particles from the exposed banks into the Coquitlam Lake. Water District staff, anticipating further deterioration of water quality, decided to supply Seymour water to the Coquitlam service area. This was accomplished by operating a pumping station in New Westminster. The flow in the Coquitlam pipeline was reversed and chlorinated water was discharged via the turbine waste water upstream of the fish hatchery. This turbine, which provides high pressure water for the chlorination system, discharges its waste water into a ditch from which the POCO Club obtains some of the water needs for the fish hatchery. Water for the fish hatchery is also taken from a small creek located nearby. The turbine discharge water is used for the fish in the winter because the lake water is at a higher temperature than the creek water and there-fore more conducive to fish growth. During the summer months when the flow in the nearby stream is very low, the turbine water is again used to meet the hatchery water requirements. Chlorinated water was inadvertently discharged through the turbine and was piped directly to the fish hatchery through the Club's pipeline. Had this incident been anticipated, the turbine could have been shut down by closing a valve.

Fish have a very low tolerance level to chlorine. A concentration as low as .002 milligrams of chlorine per litre of water is

lethal to salmonids whereas the Provincial drinking water standards specify a chlorine residual at the costumer's tap of 0.2 mg/b which is 100 times stronger.

The District will do everything practical to prevent a reoccurrence of this incident, and will continue to cooperate with the POCO Club in its efforts to enhance the fish stocks in the Coquitlam River. However, the best prevention measure would be to use another source of water for the hatchery rather than the discharge water from the turbine, and we understand the Club is looking at an alternative source.





Re: Grant Application for Recycling Program

The City of Port Coquitlam is currently negotiating with International Paper Industries to provide a <u>Curbside Pickup Recycling Program</u> for newspaper material. In this context, newspaper means all newsprint, all bond paper, flyers printed on glossy paper and magazines not glue bound.

The curbside pickup recycling program under consideration basically involves the regular collection of old newspapers by International Paper Industries in conjunction with a local non-profit organization on a bi-weekly basis. Residents will be asked to place their old newspapers into a special recycling plastic bag provided for them for this purpose. This recycling program will involve all of the estimated 7,700 single family residences in the City. In many respect, our proposed curbside pickup recycling program will be similar to the program currently in operation in the three Northshore communities. We are expecting that our program will, in time, prove to be equally as successful.

In order to assist the City in getting this, worthwhile recycling program started we are requesting funding assistance from your organization. The amount of grant which we are requesting is \$2,000. This money will help to off-set a portion of the total cost needed to purchase the plastic recycling bags initially.
