SUBJECT: Thompson and Lions Park Parking Lot

Earlier this summer a consultant was hired to do working drawings and cost estimates for the parking lots at Thompson and Lions Park. Outlined below are the estimates that were provided to us by the consultant:

#### THOMPSON PARK:

a) Gravel base= \$16,700

b) Mix asphalt base= \$21,900

#### LIONS PARK:

a) Gravel base= \$20,711

)) Mix asphalt base= \$27,250

\*phase 1 of the re-development of Lions Park was estimated at \$82,200 and this included \$27,250 for the parking lot.

Since receiving approval from council for the money we have gone out to tender for the parking lots at both parks. The low tenders for the parking lots are as follows:

#### THOMPSON PARK:

a) Gravel base= \$22,669

#### LIONS PARK

a) Asphalt mix base= \$38,711

The rational for going for a gravel base in Thompson was that the present parking lot is already gravel, and it would have been an additional cost to extend the asphalt mix to the existing parking area.

As you will note the tender prices are higher than the estimates.

1. LIONS PARK

a) leave as is and go over budget

) go back to council for additional funds

2. THOMPSON PARK a) leave as is

leave as is and go over capital budget ask for additional money in the capital budget to cover b) increase

don't do Thompson park until 1989 and re-direct money to do the pathway at Birchwood Park.



Re: Centennial Pool Feasibility Study Your File No. MO6-88-JT Our File No. 1262

Further to your July 25, 1988 letter to us, we have now reviewed the June, 1988 feasibility study for Centennial Pool.

In brief, the concerns expressed in the report, particularly with respect to the deficiencies in the electrical system, present some serious liability concerns. As an "occupier" of the Pool, the City owes a duty of care pursuant to the Occupiers Liability Act R.S.B.C. 1979, c. 303, section 3(1):

"to take that care that in all the circumstances of the case is reasonable to see that a person, and his property, on the premises, and property on the premises of a person, whether or not that person himself enters on the premises, will be reasonably safe in using the premises".

Section 3(2) provides that this duty of care applies in relation to the:

(a) condition of the premises;

(b) activities on the premises; or
(c) conduct of third parties on the premises".

Given that the City now has specific knowledge of safety concerns (and as an aside, this study would be available through discovery to other parties in any litigation involving the pool), failure to take any steps would not likely be seen by the Courts as reasonable in the circumstances. Thus, in the unfortunate event of an accident arising out of the deficiencies listed in the feasibility study, the failure to act would most

likely be a breach of the statutory duty of care and render the City liable for any damages or loss suffered. Finally, the better view is that a policy resolution can not avoid or diminish a statutory duty of care and so the City can not avoid the potential liability through a conscious decision to take no corrective steps.

In June of this year a committee of 4 people was set to develop initial plans for a youth program. The committee consisted of -

a) Larry Wheeler, Recreation Manager

b) Darlene Grieve, Area Supervisor

c) Bev Irvine, Area Supervisor

d) Erin Murphy, Special Populations Worker

Three main objectives were decided:

a) to hold a teen meeting before school ended for the summer

b) contract an individual to work directly with the

teens for the summer months

c) develop a "summer teen program" for 12-18 year olds, concentrating on the younger teens to help develop a strong program as the years progress

Using the names of interested teens received from the BCIT student report for direct advertising and the schools student councils, teachers and administration staff Erin got the word out. A meeting was held, which has given us an enthusiastic core of teens to work with. Randy Jones was contracted for July and August as a teen worker under Erin's supervision. Attached is a list of objectives Randy and Erin have developed to ensure a

For each month of July and August a "Calendar of Events" has been planned. (please see attached) The teens have been involved in all phases; planning, advertising, and implementation.

Each month has been designed to include weekly activities, special events, out trips and an overnight trip. The July events have been well attended with 55 involved in the Summer Kick-off, the weekly activities averaging 25 teens and the outtrips and overnight trips reaching maximum numbers set for these events. (12 - 20 on outtrips and 12 on the overnight trip)

A "Teen Activity Card" has been designed. The card fee is \$5.00 and gives the owner discount prices on some events and activities. The card also provides an avenue of "I belong" for the teens and provides the program staff with a committed group of individuals for advertising, planning and feedback.

Meeting Rooms 3 & 4 at Hyde Creek are being used as a "Teen Room" for the summer (we will have a problem finding a location for Fall/Winter/Spring.) Under supervision and at set times the teens can play ping pong, shuffleboard, watch videos, talk, meet, make posters, etc. It provides them with an area they can

The combination of Randy and Erin has worked extremely well in establishing a strong youth program in such a short period of time. Their personalities and skills has generated a strong positive youth environment for the community. (see attached newspaper article) They are both enthusiastic, communicate well with the teens and are challenged by this project. The success of the program to date must go to these two individuals.

As the project has generated such interest and enthusiasm we will continue into the Fall months. The detailed fall program is currently in the planning stages. We will again start off with a well advertised Teen meeting to gain insight to the wants and needs of the Youth during the school months as well as a "Summer End/Back to School Dance" for September. Our public skating schedule will include a Teen skate time, new for this fall, which will compliment the Youth Project.

The "Youth Area" is promising to be one in which all can be proud

The drop-in program started with a pool party July 8 and has continued with daily activities during the week.

Five of the teens on hand for an afternoon of floor hockey and other sports July 28 all said they had attended the program almost said they had attended the program almost daily since the start.

old Don Jacques. He adds that his parents are not "that bad," and said he enjoys the variety of activities and the chance to meet new people.

"It's better than staying home all day. It

keeps you out of trouble and you get to do something," 16-year-old Ken Thurston said. He cites playing floor hockey, watching movies and playing volleyball as his favorite activities.

"I've been coming to all the activities," said 15-year-old Kelly MacAulay. "It's fun and you get away from your parents. I like getting out of the house."

Out-trips, like the afternoon at Belcarra Park, a bike trip and a canoe trip, are her favorite activities.

Sister Keri, 14, enjoys the sports and making new friends while Greg Johnston, 16, another regular visitor, says,

nothing really to do otherwise than come

Without the program, several of the teens said they would spend the summer sitting at

home doing nothing or watching television.

Pressure from teens, via a delegation to
Port Coquitlam Mayor Leonard Traboulay,
led to the start of the pilot program.

University of B.C. Education student Randy Jones was hired to work with the teens while Erin Murphy, hired as special populations programmer, helped him draft the for-

A meeting with teens, held in mid-June, gave the program organizers more ideas and the program kicked off with a pool party July 8. ALmost 60 teens turned out for the pool party and since then an average of 25 teens turn up daily.

Program activities are casual, varied and low-cost, as Murphy notes teenagers don't like to be programmed and usually do not have much money.

"I grew up as a teenager here and what I found is the schools keep teens active after school but there is a group who are not getting what they want at school," Murphy explained.

Organizers hope to continue the program through the fall and winter, with a variety of special events including a fall dance and a halloween party.
