
Dear Sir:-

Your letter of February the 26th has been received, and on looking up our Minutes I find that on account of conditions arising after the outbreak of War, ~~that~~ your resignation, as contained in your letter of December 31st, 1914, was never accepted. In view of this there are two alternatives open to you. The first is that I should have your resignation accepted by Council as dating from 1914; in this case it will be necessary for you to re-apply for membership on the usual application form, filled in by a proposer and seconder. This will mean, of course, that you will be liable for 1920 fees only. The other alternative is that by letting the matter stand you will be entitled to full membership privileges continuously, as members serving overseas were exempted from fees from their year of enlistment until 1919, when they were replaced on the paying list. You would be liable for dues for 1915, 1919 and the current year. Members serving overseas, also, receive the Transactions free during that period. This means that on the payment of \$30.00 you will receive the Transactions for 1915 to 1919 inclusive, and it will not be necessary to re-apply

for membership.

If you will kindly advise me, as early as possible, which alternative you choose I will be very glad to look after the matter from this end. In view of your choosing the first alternative, I am enclosing an application form for submission to Council.
