Royal Order Milk + Cream for
Princess Marguerite, Adelaide and
S.S. Princess Robert. May 29th

I beg to report I was
taken out to H. Savage Farm
Sedon B.C. on May 28 by Mr.
Flemming Mgr Jersey Farms Dairy
also plant bacteriologist Mr. Ingledes
H. Savage Farm Grade A premises
also licensed by City of Vancouver
to vend raw milk.

Dairy barn had been freshly
lime-washed excellent sanitary
condition. Milk house also
in excellent sanitary conditions.

22 head of Jersey cows all
blood + tuberculin tested
cows milk early Monday morning
May 29th. Udders + belly

of cows clipped and washed
with disinfectant. Fore
milk (first two squirts) rejected
Machine milk. All equipment
clean + well sterilized.

Milkers had clean white
clothing. After each cow
was milked, the pail of
milk taken to dairy strained
and immediately cooled to

40°F. Milk placed in
6 new clean + sterilized
10 gal cans. These cans
were brought out from Jersey
Farms Dairy sealed and waxed
paper placed around lid.

After milk placed in these
cans, the cans were sealed
and wax paper placed over
lid to prevent dust getting
in. This operation under

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Supervision of Mr. Savage
Farm mgr., Mr. Ingledew
bacteriologist, City Ford
& Sanitary Inspector Mr.
Euman. Mr. Ingledew
& myself accompanied
this special load of milk
to Jersey Farms Dairy
Vancouver. This milk was
placed in clean pasteurizer
and pasteurized to temp 143°F
for 30 minutes cooled
to temp of 40°F placed
in sterile containers and
sealed. Freshly separated
cream pasteurized to temp
143°F 30' cooled to 40°F
placed in clean sterilized
containers and sealed
placed in cold storage
ready for shipment.

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Samples of all these
products taken for
analysis. The dairy
equipment and personal
very satisfactory.

This operation under the
supervision of plant supt.
Mr. Davidson, plant bacteriologist
Mr. Ingledew & City Ford
& Sanitary Inspector Mr.
Euman!
