Dear Sir,

On 12th inst., I received your letter of 7th January asking me to accept your resignation as a member of the Society. I am sorry that in terms of the By-Law, of which I enclose a copy, I am precluded from doing as you ask, as your resignation, to be effective, should be accompanied by payment of the subscription which fell due on 1st January. In order to avoid having to pay this subscription, your resignation ought to have reached me before the end of last year.

Two courses are now open to you. You may either pay your subscription for the current year and resign formally before the end of next year; or, on the other hand, if you take no further steps in the matter, your name will be deleted in due course from the register of members on account of non-payment.
